## \$4.6m Loan **considered** for new library

**MULTI-million dollar** investments in Cottesloe's public buildings were on the agenda this month when Council received reports on funding for a new library, and Civic Centre improvements.

Councillors are now seeking residents' comments on a plan to raise a 4.6m loan for Cottesloe's share of the new library and community facilities.

The projected new library will cost a total of approximately \$11.3m and be shared with the Town of Mosman Park and Shire of Peppermint Grove – as is the existing library. The three councils will share the costs, each paying a proportion based on population. Cottesloe's share is 42.74%; Mosman pays 48.29%; and the much smaller Peppermint Grove 9.25%.

#### Loan

projected Cottesloe's spending was not included in last year's budget, and the Town must now engage in public consultation before proceeding further.

The \$4.6m loan that is being considered would be repayable over 20 years. To meet repayments, a rate increase of 3.92 per cent is projected for the 2008/09 year, followed by a similar amount in 2009/10. The Town's debt service ratio would rise to nine per cent, a level that is considered quite manageable.

#### Budget

The outlay was not bud-eted for 2007/2008 geted because of uncertainty over land tenure, construction costs and related matters.

"Council has now been advised that inflationary cost pressures have reached such a point that tenders should be called as soon as possible, rather than wait until the new financial year,' said CEO Steve Tindale.

"Sale of our depot depends partly on future arrangements for a replacement facility in the area.
