#### John St will see pines report

**OLDEST** of Cottesloe's **Norfolk Island Pine trees** are now more than 100 years old - and they're showing their age.

Collapse of a tree in John Street in July, over a parked car and onto a house, raised questions about the condition of other pine trees in the Town. Council staff commissioned a report by a very experienced and qualified arboricultural consultant, and this will now be sent to all John Street residents.

It gives general information and background on the growth of Norfolk Island Pine trees, both in Cottesloe and on Norfolk Island, expectations on length of life for these trees and a more detailed assessment on the pine trees in John Street.

Part of the report indicates that trees in John Street have not been planted or maintained in high quality conditions, because wind, rainfall and temperature levels are different from conditions where the species evolved, on Norfolk Island. Roots and branches have suffered various services from installed on the road verge, parked vehicles and damage from home building activities over many years.

The consultant says all the remaining trees planted in John Street in 1904 'have passed their period of optimum health and vigour and are now in gradual decline albeit to varying degrees'.

#### Replacing trees

Council decided that John Street residents should see a full version of the consul-

make comments and submission based on it. Subject to their responses, four trees would replaced with the same species.

Also, a 2009-2010 budget allocation would allow inspection of all Norfolk Island pines in Cottesloe in a programme to be devised by Council staff.
