COMMUNITY events such as the Seadragon Festival, Australia Day, Great Gardens and Civic Centre concerts will all be examined for effectiveness and value for money. Over the past two years audiences at the Music for Pleasure and Twilight concerts have declined, with some performers suggesting the Town do more advertising. Other events, such as Australia Day and the Great Gardens have remained popular; and this years Seadragon Festival did attract around 3,000 people.

Among suggested possibilities is a combined festival and evening concert event.
